Frequently Asked Questions. What do forensic social scientists do? Forensic social scientists apply different social sciences theories and methods from anthropology, archaeology, economics, psychiatry, psychology, psychiatry, social work, sociology, and related fields to areas of law such as civil, criminal, immigration, military, and admiralty law.
